

Audi FIS Alpine Skiing World Cup 2025/26 – Women's Slalom Copper Mountain, CO stat sheet

Note: these facts do not take into account the result of Saturday's Giant Slalom.

Previous race (Gurgl) & General Slalom Stats

- In the 2025/26 Gurgl Slalom, Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)'s winning margin over second-placed Lara Colturi's (ALB/Blizzard) was 1.23s. Last year in Gurgl, seven skiers were within 1.23s of Shiffrin's winning time.
- Mikaela Shiffrin's (USA/Atomic) victory in Gurgl took her career total to 103 World Cup wins among 159 podiums. Both are the most for women's or men's skiers Shiffrin is 17 wins clear of Ingemar Stenmark (SWE) on 86, and 21 wins clear of third-placed Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head) on 82. For podiums, Shiffrin's 159 is four clear of Stenmark (155) and 19 clear of Vonn and Marcel Hirscher (AUT), both on 138.
- Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) holds the record for most Slalom podiums for men's or women's skiers with 91, 10 ahead of Ingemar Stenmark (SWE) and 35 ahead of her nearest women's rival, Marlies Schild (AUT) on 56. Shiffrin also has the most SL victories with 66, ahead of Stenmark (40) and Schild (35).
- Among the top 10 skiers to have won the most men's or women's World Cup Slalom races, Mikaela Shiffrin's (USA/Atomic) ratio of wins (66) to podiums (91) is the highest at 73%. In second place is Vreni Schneider (SUI) with 72% (34 wins from 47 podiums).
- Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head), who finished fourth in Gurgl, is ranked sixth for all-time women's Slalom World Cup podiums with 38, four behind her fifth-ranked compatriot Erika Hess (SUI), but Holdener has just two victories for a win-to-podium ratio of 5%. The next lowest win-to-podium ratio among the five women with more career SL podiums than Holdener is Hess on 50% with 21 wins from 42 podiums.
- Lena Duerr (GER/Head) and Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) are the only two skiers to have made four Slalom podiums in each of the past four seasons (2021/22 to 2024/25)
- In 2022/23, Lena Duerr (GER/Head) became the oldest German skier to win a women's World Cup Slalom race when she triumphed in Spindleruv Mlyn at age 31. Any victory this season will increase her record.
- In 2022/23, Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) became the first, and to date only, skier to make 10 women's SL podiums in a single season. Shiffrin is also the first skier to make eight or more SL podiums for three consecutive seasons (2016/17, 2017/18 and 2018/19). Shiffrin is also the only skier to have made at least one women's World Cup Slalom podium in every season since 2011/12. Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head) is the next best, having made a SL podium in every season since 2014/15.



All three skiers who won more than one women's Slalom race last season managed to win all but one of the races in which they finished on the podium: Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) won four of the five SL races in which she finished on the podium; Zrinka Ljutic (CRO/Atomic) won three of the four SL races in which she finished on the podium; and Camille Rast (SUI/Head) won two of the three SL races in which she finished on the podium.

Women's Slalom Copper Mountain, CO stats

- Three women's Slalom World Cup races have been held at Copper Mountain, CO: 1975/76, 1999/00 and 2001/02. No USA skier has finished on the podium in these three events.
- Austria has the most podium finishes (3) for women's Slalom in Copper Mountain, CO, followed by France with two, including a tie for first between Christel Pascal-Saioni (FRA) and Spela Pretnar (SLO) in 1999/00, which was the second ever women's World Cup SL race to finish in a tie (the first was Lara Magoni (ITA) and Pernilla Wiberg (SWE) in 1996/97 in Vail, CO.)
- USA is the most successful women's Slalom nation in terms of race victories (99), and in Copper Mountain, CO could become the first nation to register 100 women's SL World Cup wins. Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) is responsible for precisely two-thirds (66) of those victories.
- Austria sits behind USA for most women's World Cup Slalom wins with 89, but Austria
 has more Top 3 finishes with 286 compared to USA's 201. Switzerland is third for both
 women's SL victories (81) and Top 3 finishes with 200 podiums, meaning Switzerland
 could surpass USA for World Cup SL podiums depending on the outcome of Copper
 Mountain, CO race this weekend.
- If Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) wins in Copper Mountain, CO it will mark the third time she has won at least the opening three Slalom races of the season, having won the first three races in 2019/20, the first five in 2018/19 and the first four in 2016/17.
- A victory in Copper Mountain, CO for Shiffrin would also increase her record as the oldest USA athlete to win a women's World Cup Slalom race. Shiffrin, 30, has broken her own record 18 times since 2022.
- Katharina Liensberger (AUT/Rossignol) is currently on 17 women's World Cup Slalom podiums, which is equal-21st for career SL podiums alongside Tina Maze (SLO), Annemarie Moser-Proell (AUT) and Sarka Strachova (CZE). Lena Duerr (GER/Head) is currently on 16 career SL podiums, meaning a Top 3 finish for Duerr in Copper Mountain, CO could see her join Maze, Moser-Proell, Strachova and potentially Liensberger (if Liensberger does not also make the podium.)
- Lara Colturi's (ALB/Blizzard) second-place finishes in Levi and Gurgl equalled her career best result and marked the first time she made back-to-back World Cup



podiums. A win in **Copper Mountain, CO** would mark her first World Cup victory, while a Top 3 finish would mark the first time she has made the podium in three consecutive races.

- If Camille Rast (SUI/Head) or Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head) win in Copper Mountain, CO, they will move from equal-fifth (alongside Sonja Nef and Karin Roten Meier) to outright fifth on Switzerland's list for all-time women's World Cup Slalom victories. If Holdener wins, she will become the oldest athlete representing Switzerland to win a women's World Cup Slalom race at age 32 (Vreni Schneider holds the current record of age 30). If Rast makes the podium in Copper Mountain, CO, she will have already achieved two podiums in four races this season, compared with four podiums from 19 races that Rast achieved last season.
- If Lena Duerr (GER/Head) wins in Copper Mountain, CO it will be her third World Cup race win, which will see her move from equal-sixth (alongside Emma Aicher, Kathrin Hoelzl, Petra Haltmayr and Katharina Gutensohn) to outright sixth on Germany's list for all-time women's World Cup victories. For Slalom races only, a victory in Copper Mountain, CO would see Duerr become Germany's second most successful women's SL skier with three wins, behind leader Maria Hoefl-Riesch (GER) on nine.
- If Paula Moltzan (USA/Rossignol) makes the podium in Copper Mountain, CO, she will move from equal-10th to outright 10th on the USA's list for all-time women's World Cup Slalom podiums. Moltzan is currently on three SL podiums, two behind Lindsey Vonn (USA) on five. Moltzan is the only USA skier besides Shiffrin to have made more than one World Cup SL podium since 2009/10, finishing second in Semmering in 2022/23, third in Soldeu in 2023/24 and third in Sestriere in 2024/25.
- Other USA skiers likely to feature in Copper Mountain, CO include Nina O'Brien
 (USA/Rossignol) and AJ Hurt (USA/Head). O'Brien who was the only athlete that
 finished inside the Top 10 in this season's Giant Slalom opener in Sölden who is yet to
 make a World Cup podium in any event. Both O'Brien and Hurt were unable to finish in
 Levi or Gurgl. Hurt is the only USA women's skier besides Shiffrin and Moltzan to make
 a World Cup SL podium since Resi Stiegler (USA) in 2011/12.
