

PREVIEW WOMEN'S SUPER G KVITFJELL – Sunday 3 Mar 2024

Lara Gut-Behrami

- Lara Gut-Behrami (360 points) leads Cornelia Hütter (355) by five points in this season's women's World Cup super-G standings coming into Kvitfjell. There are a maximum 200 points up for grabs in the remaining two events.
- Gut-Behrami (4) aims to equal Lindsey Vonn and Katja Seizinger on a joint-record five crystal globes in the super-G on the women's side. Gut-Behrami lifted the trophy in 2013/14, 2015/16, 2020/21 and 2022/23.
- This weekend, Gut-Behrami (44) could equal Renate Götschl (46) in fifth place on most individual World Cup wins among women. Vreni Schneider (55 wins, in fourth place) is the only Swiss woman to have claimed as many individual World Cup victories as Gut-Behrami.
- Gut-Behrami (21) is second for most World Cup super-G wins among women, only trailing Lindsey Vonn (28).
- Gut-Behrami (2) can win more than two World Cup super-G events in a single season for the first time since 2020/21 (4).
- Gut-Behrami's came third in the first Kvitfjell super-G in last season's World Cup (3 March 2023), but came only 20th in the second one two days later.

Norway

- Ragnhild Mowinckel can claim her third World Cup victory in the super-G, following first places in Courchevel (17 March 2022) and Cortina d'Ampezzo (22 January 2023). She is the only Norwegian woman to have won multiple World Cup super-G events.
- Norway's only other two World Cup victories in a women's super-G were achieved by Merete Fjeldavlie in Vail on 9 March 1992 and by Ingeborg Helen Marken in Kvitfjell on 7 March 1996.
- Neither Mowinckel (14th and 15th) nor Kajsa Vickhoff Lie (19th and 18th) came close to a good result in the two super-G events in Kvitfjell in last season's World Cup (3 and 5 March 2023).

Other contenders

- **Stephanie Venier** won the World Cup super-G event in Crans-Montana on 18 February. She can become the first Austrian woman to win successive super-G's in the World Cup since Renate Götschl recorded back-to-back victories in Lake Louise and Reiteralm in December 2006.
- Venier recorded podium finishes in each of her last two starts in World Cup super-G events (2nd, 1st). That is more podium finishes than in the previous six seasons combined (2017/18-2022/23), when her only podium result was a second place in Kvitfjell on 5 March 2023.
- Cornelia Hütter (3 March 2023) and Nina Ortlieb (5 March 2023) achieved the double for Austria in the Kvitfjell super-G's in last season's World Cup.





- Hütter's super-G results at World Cup level include: 1st place (4 times), 2nd place (4 times), 3rd place (4 times), 4th place (4 times) and 5th place (4 times).
- **Federica Brignone** (9) is one short of becoming the seventh woman to win 10 World Cup super-G events. Michaela Dorfmeister is sixth on the all-time list on 10 wins.
- Marta Bassino (super-G world champion in 2023) seeks her first World Cup super-G victory. She recorded five podium finishes at World Cup level in this discipline so far (two second places, three third places).
- Romane Miradoli (3) aims to become the fourth French woman to record more than three World Cup super-G podium finishes, following Carole Merle (16), Carole Montillet-Carles (12) and Régine Cavagnoud (12).
- **Mirjam Puchner** took the silver medal in this discipline at the Beijing 2022 Winter Olympic Games. At World Cup level, she has never finished higher than third place (twice) in a super-G event (2021/22 Lake Louise and 2023/24 Altenmarkt).
