

PREVIEW WOMEN'S SUPER-G VAL DI FASSA – Saturday 24 and Sunday 25 Feb 2024

Lara Gut-Behrami

- Lara Gut-Behrami (360 points) leads Cornelia Hütter (355) by five points in this season's women's World Cup super-G standings coming into Val di Fassa. After this weekend's events, there are 200 more points to be won.
- This weekend, Gut-Behrami (44 individual World Cup wins) could equal Renate Götschl (46) in fifth place of most World Cup wins among women.
 Vreni Schneider (55 wins, in 4th place) is the only Swiss woman to have won more World Cups than Gut-Behrami.
- Gut-Behrami (21) is second for most World Cup super-G wins among women, only trailing Lindsey Vonn (28).
- Gut-Behrami (2) can win more than two World Cup super-G events in a single season for the first time since 2020/21 (4).
- Lara Gut-Behrami won two of the three World Cup events in Val di Fassa, all held in February 2021. Both wins came in downhill events. She finished second in the super-G event.

Federica Brignone

- This will be the second World Cup visit to Val di Fassa. Federica Brignone won the super-G event on 28 February 2021, ahead of Lara Gut-Behrami and Corinne Suter.
- Brignone can become the first Italian woman to win multiple World Cup super-G events in Italy. The other Italian super-G winners in Italy are: Isolde Kostner (Cortina d'Ampezzo, 1997) and Elena Curtoni (Cortina d'Ampezzo, 2022).
- Brignone (9) is one short of becoming the seventh woman to win 10 World Cup super-G events. Brignone (18) can also become the ninth woman to record 20 World Cup super-G podiums.

Other contenders

- Stephanie Venier won the most recent World Cup super-G event in Crans-Montana on 18 February. She can become the first Austrian woman to win successive super-G's in the World Cup since Renate Götschl recorded back-to-back victories in Lake Louise and Reiteralm in December 2006.
- Venier recorded podium finishes in each of her last two starts in World Cup super-G events (2nd, 1st). That is more podium finishes than in the previous six seasons combined (2017/18-2022/23), when her only podium was a second place in Kvitfjell in March 2023.
- Each of the last seven World Cup super-G events in Italy were won by seven different women: Ilka Štuhec (Val Gardena, 2018), Mikaela Shiffrin (Cortina d'Ampezzo, 2019), Nina Ortlieb (La Thuile, 2020), Federica Brignone (Val di Fassa, 2021), Elena Curtoni (Cortina, 2022), Ragnhild Mowinckel (Cortina, 2023), Lara Gut-Behrami (Cortina, 2024).





- Mowinckel can claim her third World Cup victory in the super-G, following first places in Courchevel (March 2022) and Cortina d'Ampezzo (January 2023). She is the only Norwegian woman to have won multiple World Cup super-G events.
- Marta Bassino (super-G world champion in 2023) seeks her first World Cup super-G victory. She recorded five podium finishes so far (2 second places, 3 third places), including a third place in the most recent World Cup super-G in Crans-Montana on 18 February.
- Cornelia Hütter won the World Cup super-G in Altenmarkt/Zauchensee on 12 January. Hütter's super-G results include: 1st place (4 times), 2nd place (4 times), 3rd pLace (4 times), 4th place (4 times) and 5th place (4 times).
- Romane Miradoli (3) aims to become the fourth French woman to record more than three World Cup super-G podium finishes, following Carole Merle (16), Carole Montillet-Carles (12) and Régine Cavagnoud (12).
- Among active women, **Kajsa Vickhoff Lie** (3 second places) has recorded the most World Cup super-G runner-up finishes without winning once.
- Mirjam Puchner took the silver medal in this discipline at the Beijing 2022 Winter Olympic Games. At World Cup level, she has never finished higher than third place (twice) in a super-G event (2021/22 Lake Louise and 2023/24 Altenmarkt).
- **Kira Weidle** celebrates her 28th birthday on the day of the first super-G event this weekend (24 February). She could become the first woman to claim a super-G podium finish on her birthday.
